Background

- Newbattle Abbey College was asked to develop AAAs by Education Scotland and the Scottish Credit and Qualification Framework (SCQF) Partnership
- Awards credit-rated by Edinburgh Napier University at SCQF Levels 3, 4 and 6
- Level 2 has now been developed yet to be creditrated
- Awards offer national accreditation to adults for their learning in:
 - the community
 - college
 - the workplace
 - the family
 - the voluntary sector
 - volunteering programmes
 - prison

AAA Features

- optional
- context-free
- not formal programmes themselves but can accredit learning in a range of programmes
- no entry requirements
- can be undertaken individually or in groups
- based on a Reflective Learning approaches
- offer progression to further accredited learning
- learners supported by local tutors/mentors
- flexible and inclusive

How Do AAAs Work?

- Adults should have been involved in learning in the past year - can also involve current learning
- Awards based on Learning Outcomes which ask adults to:
 - review learning
 - record learning
 - reflect on learning
 - plan future learning
- Learners receive:
 - Learner Guide work book
 - Reflective Journal only assessed document
- Tutors receive Tutor Guide

Reflective Journal

- based on Learning Outcomes for each level
- only the Reflective Journal is assessed
- can be submitted for assessment:
 - online
 - orally
 - in written format
 - with support from scribe
- signed off locally by tutors
- assessed locally, if appropriate, or by Newbattle
- certificated by Newbattle

AAA Levels

- Level 2
 - 30 hours of learning/400 words approx
 - 3 Learning Outcomes
- Level 3
 - 30 hours of learning/750 words approx
 - 3 Learning Outcomes
- Level 4
 - 40 hours of learning/1000 words approx
 - 4 Learning Outcomes
- Level 6
 - 60 hours of Learning/1500 words approx
 - 3 Learning Outcomes

Learning hours include the time it takes to complete the Reflective Journal.

Newbattle Provides

- Learner Guides for each level
- Reflective Journals for each level
- Tutor Guides for each level
- training and ongoing support
- admin to support awards
- quality assurance: assessment or external verification
- certification

Role of Local Tutors

- attend AAA training
- liaise with potential learners
- offer ongoing support to learners
- support preparation of Reflective Journals
- sign off and submit Reflective Journals to Newbattle for assessment/external verification
- support re-submissions, if necessary

AAA Pilot Evaluation

- undertaken by Education Scotland
- national report published in June 2016
- The awards are lifelong and accessible to all stages of a person's life.
- The awards are helping re-engage those who haven't undertaken any accredited learning for some time.
- All learners involved are gaining in confidence and self-esteem.
- The awards are working well for learners in a range of contexts.

AAA Pilot Evaluation

What local Tutors and learners said:

- The sense of achievement for the student is awesome.
- The Adult Achievement Awards have been pivotal in getting me out of the house.
- Made me more aware of my own strengths and has given me the confidence to continue learning.
- An excellent way for students to set goals for themselves and monitor their progress.
- The most exciting development in adult education for years!

Phase 2 Pilot Programme

- Sep 2016 June 2017
- 20 cross-sectoral pilots
- across Scotland and Isle of Man
- over 300 learners SCQF levels 3, 4 and 6
- also piloting Business Plan: annual licence fee; training costs; student fees
- national dissemination conference on 29 March 2017 at Newbattle - Cabinet Secretary for Education and Skills gave the keynote address
